The Birds of Montgomery County

Welcome to the Birds of Montgomery County

Sitting astride the Piedmont Plateau, Montgomery County, MD includes a wide variety of habitats, from highly developed city/suburban to rural farmland. Virtually all forested areas in the county are second-growth, albeit some quite old. The county is bounded on the south by the Potomac River and on the north by the Patuxent River and includes many large and small lakes, ponds, and a few vital wetlands of significant importance. Included within the boundaries of the county is a long stretch of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal National Park, Rock Creek Regional Park, and the Triadelphia and Duckett Reservoir watersheds on the upper Patuxent River. Maryland public lands falling within the boundaries of the county include sections of the Patuxent River State Park, Seneca Creek State Park, and the McKee-Beshers Wildlife Management Area.

This list, compiled by the Montgomery County Chapter of the Maryland Ornithological Society (MOS), contains seasonal abundance information for 252 species of birds which regularly occur in the county, either as Winter inhabitants, Summer breeders, migratory pass-throughs, or year-round residents. An additional list of 65 accidentals is included for those bird species which have been seen only a few times during the past twenty years. The total number of avian species for Montgomery County is thus 317. If the species name is followed by an asterisk (*), the bird is one of the 120 known breeders in Montgomery County.

The seasons noted in the checklist include Spring (Sp, with the months March, April, and May), Summer (Su: June and July), Fall (F, including August through November), and Winter (W: December, January, and February).

For each season/species combination, the following abundance codes are used:

blank — the bird is not thought to be present in the county during that period.

c — the bird is common to abundant, i.e., it should be readily seen or heard if searched for in suitable habitat.

u — the bird is uncommon. This means that the bird is generally present in the county at the right time of year and in the correct habitat, but it may not be readily seen or heard due to its secretive behavior or relative scarcity.

o — the bird is occasionally present during the period. That is, it is generally seen only a few times during any given season.

r — the bird is rare. Generally speaking, the bird is not seen every year but is seen often enough that it no longer has a claim as an accidental species.

Our knowledge of bird distributions is constantly evolving and this checklist will likely be out of date almost as soon as it is printed. If you see a bird that is not on this list or that is considered an accidental or rare species, you should definitely notify other birders of your sighting. The easiest way to do this is to notify the Voice of the Naturalist, a weekly telephone hotline maintained for birders by the Audubon Naturalist Society in Chevy Chase, MD. You may notify the Voice of your sightings in one of three ways: by voice, at 301-652-9188 x 3101; by FAX, at 301-951-7179; or by Computer Bulletin Board (post your message to ANS Voice) at 301-989-9036.

If you are convinced that you have found a true rarity, it is very important that you document your sighting carefully. Write up a full description of the bird, including details about the locale, time of day, optics used, lighting conditions, and as full detail as possible on its plumage, soft parts, and behavior. Sketches or photographs are also quite helpful.
